Accommodating the Growing Chinese Economy to Human Security

China's economy is growing fast to be a challenger of the US. Its economic prosperity will be not only a ground for checking American dominance in this region, but also a risk factor to the human security of neighboring countries. China's Thirteenth Five-Year Plan (2016-20), released during the Two Sessions in mid-March, states that China would continue constructing "a new pattern of all-round opening." They adopted a strategic road map to enhance the level of utilization of foreign capital and investment. China also decided to approach global economic governance through mutual-trust and cooperation. Its global impact will be influential. Such a blueprint, however, is not always promising, as shown by the current disputes with TPP, AIIB and even the military clash in the South China Sea. History shows that economic expansion is not always fruitful; it could even lead to a disaster without a sincere consideration of human security. This is what we would like to point out at this research forum.
